### ICAS Digital Technologies Victorian Medal Winner for 2018 – Jayden Bardrick



### Faith in Action

On Friday 20 July, during a Year 7 Corsini Religious Education lesson, Janet from the Kiwanis Club supervised the Year 7 group putting together the emergency packs for Doncare. It was a great success and we managed to make 40 packs in the one lesson!

A big thank you to the parents, students and staff of Corsini House to make this initiative happen and we hope to replicate this success in Term 4.

Whitefriars College is the first boys school in Australia to take up the championship of this women's health initiative, and we would love for all of our College community, parents, staff and students to continue to be on board. The benefits to the girls and women receiving the Days for Girls kits are immediate – some aspects of their lives change that day. We hope that our involvement in this cause will also benefit our students, developing their positive attitudes to women and growing their understandings around gender equality.

### NCCD to become the new funding model for schools from 2019

Funded support for students with learning disabilities in Catholic schools has widened to include a range of students who are identified as requiring regular adjustments to their learning within the classroom. From 2019 onwards, schools will receive funding for students based on whether they have received adjustments at a supplementary, substantial or extensive level in the classroom. There are four broad categories: physical, cognitive, sensory and social-emotional. Students with Specific Learning Disability, who receive adjustments to support their learning, will now be covered under the NCCD.

The data regarding student adjustments, is submitted by teachers before August each year, for the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on Students with Disabilities (NCCD). This is an Australia-wide, mandatory government collection of data, guided in our College by the Catholic Education Commission of Victoria (CECV). [Please see the NCCD Information Sheet \[here\]](#). The introduction of the NCCD, sees the end of the old funding model - [SWD Program \[here\]](#) – has now been phased out. Students who are on the SWD program in 2018, will be monitored for support through the current NCCD process from 2019 onwards. Please also see our College's updated [Privacy Policy](#) and [Collection Notice](#).

Program Support Group meetings will still be conducted for students with substantial or extensive adjustments to support their learning. For our Year 9 City Experience, we left the grounds of Whitefriars and made the city our classroom. We had to research four different topics about the city e.g. sport, culture, religion etc. and out of these four topics, our groups of 3-4 students had to make a presentation and present it to our house. Leaving the classroom to learn somewhere else was exciting. It was great to get outdoors and into the fresh air of Melbourne's CBD.

A standard day in Year 9 City Experience goes like this:

We would meet at Victoria University at 8.45am and had our names marked off by our teacher. Mr Collins would give us an overview of the day. We would then write down our plan for the day in our booklets, get it marked off and go to research our topic. After lunch we would check back in with Mr Collins. Depending on the day, we would either research our topic further or go to a year level event. At the end of the day, we would check back in at Victoria University, fill out our booklets, get them marked off and head home.

Researching topics in Melbourne's CBD was not as hard as it seemed. The city provided us with endless opportunities to gather information for our projects. Whether it was researching information or conducting a survey, we had access to everything we needed.

The main challenges were transport and meeting curfews. To travel in and out of the city was challenging, as it was different to our regular school day routine. Conducting research, working on our group project and attending year level events simultaneously, (i.e. speakers presenting to us from the Melbourne Council at the Town Hall), was challenging in the beginning, however with good organisation and time-management skills, meeting time constraints became easier, as we learnt our way around the city.

Overall, Year 9 City Experience was a memorable and extremely enjoyable time.

### Secondary School Vaccine Program

The Secondary School Vaccine Program offers free vaccines to Year 7 and 10 students. These vaccines provide protection against:

- Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) – one dose for Year 7 students
- Human Papillomavirus (HPV) – two doses for Year 7 students
- Meningococcal A,C,W,Y – one dose for Year 10 students

Parents/guardians of Year 7 and 10 students should look out for the vaccine consent card booklet coming home from school with your child later this term. You need to read the information, complete and return the card regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.

The Manningham City Council immunisation service may contact you about the Secondary School Vaccine Program. Schools are authorised to provide basic parent/guardian contact details to local councils for this purpose.

**Please contact Whitefriars College by 6 August 2018 if you do not want your contact details given to the Manningham City Council immunisation service.**

To learn more about the Secondary School Vaccine Program, the vaccines, the diseases they protect against, or how you can prepare your child for vaccination, go to [betterhealth.vic.gov.au](http://betterhealth.vic.gov.au)

Additionally, the Commonwealth government is funding vaccinations for all children under 20 years who missed scheduled vaccines. If students have missed vaccines, either in childhood or adolescence and require catch-up vaccines, they should speak with their immunisation provider, (i.e. local council or GP).

#### **Year 10 Introduction to Environmental Science**

The Sustainability and Environment team are piloting a new Year 10 science elective this term. The focus is investigating the environment, creating an edible garden and participating in environmental actions. The students completed water testing this week in the Mullum Mullum Creek. The group's results were comparable to Melbourne Water monitoring with the creek having low turbidity (clear), slightly acidic (pH 6) and 90C, which is in the healthy range. Phosphate levels will be tested next week, as these levels are elevated due possible leaking septic tanks and create an unhealthy waterway. Yarra Valley Water have been working in the Park Orchards area to update sewage processes and minimise phosphate contamination.

## Timor-Leste Immersion

### Timor-Leste Immersion

At Whitefriars we teach that the world than 'us'; that outside of our gates there is an endless amount of good and incredible opportunity. We teach that along with all of the opportunities we are afforded as gentlemen – that there are communities, both locally and internationally, that need our help. It is difficult to do justice in a short piece on what the staff and student crew achieved in the nine month lead up to the Timor-Leste trip this year, including the 12 day Immersion program in recent weeks so in brief:

- 242 Days For Girls (DFG) Kits transported to Zumalai and many distributed in the second half of our program to teenage girls. Thanks to the support of the Whitefriars community and other DFG communities around Australia.
- Metal Swing set built in a Dominican Primary school very near the Carmelite facility in Hera. The swing seats and general hardware was transported by us while the metal posts and paint were purchased locally.
- 2 large metal soccer goals built and painted in Zumalai with netting supplied from Australia.
- Netball equipment, posts and rings (sourced through Whitehorse Netball Association) delivered and set up so that the girls in Zumalai have a greater opportunity for activity, social interaction and recreation.
- Several vital electrical tools purchased for our use and for future group projects in Zumalai and Hera including new welding equipment, drills, and a metal cut off saw.
- Teaching in primary and secondary schools (some with up to 52 students in a room at a time) with just a whiteboard and chalk. Our boys loved this experience.
- 25 Tetun/English wordfinder dictionaries printed and delivered thanks to the support of our library staff along with other teaching resources.

Everyone who went on the trip will have a story to tell. There are stories and images available on the website and across our social media platforms. We are currently piecing together video of the trip and are presenting information in available forums. Below are snippets of feedback that the Immersion students wrote upon their return from Timor-Leste:

"I don't think I have specific favourite experiences. It was just simple interactions that stand out so greatly. For example, whilst building the swings, you grab the dictionary, figure out how to say rocks, and the kids who you were teaching for all of a couple hours beforehand are suddenly helping you out carrying rocks bigger than their heads to help. Such a genuine happiness and willingness to involve themselves in the same way we are on the trip makes for a phenomenal experience."

"I am definitely willing to help and assist in future projects to aid the Timorese. These projects may involve anything from future fundraisers inside or outside the school, or helping to source materials for the coming year's projects. I would also like to assist in the publicity of the Timorese and ensure that the Whitefriars Students know the situation in Timor and how they can help."

"Before this trip I had no clue what I might pursue after finishing high school. Of course, I had ideas but no concrete career path that interests me. After coming back from Timor, and thinking about it, teaching is something that gave me great joy in-country and definitely could be an option moving forward."

"I feel that this group had an immense buy-in to the trip. Having the opportunity to be the first boys school in Australia to be a part of the Days for Girls initiative meant that there was a great deal to do before the trip, and there was constantly good attendance at each of the DFG sessions. I also feel that in Timor, where possible, nothing was left up to imagination and in my group each member bought in to the experience and tried to get the most out of the experience."





## Timor-Leste Immersion continued...

"I think our group was fantastic in terms of involvement. All ready to involve in the culture, disperse and be surrounded by new people rather than being conservative and always being together. We also definitely had some standouts in terms of those ready to put themselves out there which was really inspiring. We were always ready for having fun, but also all for doing as much work as we could in our short time over there. Lead-up was a little disorganised in projects, Rens definitely carried us through a lot of that. But when required people were always willing."

"During the trip I can't really pin point a specific area that I found challenging in a negative way. A lot of the time I felt that the challenging parts were sections that I got to learn the most. I was a little bit nervous about the teaching, however, once I got into it I was able to establish the reason why people said it was the best part about the trip. Coming out of my comfort zone was good for me and has now let me to try a lot more new things that I would not of done in the past."





## Wellbeing @Whitefriars

The world that the young men in our care occupy is ever changing. As a result, we as educators need to change with it so that we can provide the best environment for our boys to thrive. One of the distressing trends for young people has been the increase in mental health issues. Statistics suggest that 25% of young people will experience a mental disorder and half of the adult mental health issues begin before the age of 14 (Kessler et. al, 2005). Wellbeing has never been more important than it is today.


In 2017, Whitefriars College introduced a new Wellbeing Program, replacing the previous Personal Development Program. It is delivered on a horizontal and vertical level (Pastoral Care groups) so that age specific issues can be explored as well as across year levels so that together, students can work to arm themselves with the tools to cope with the world in which they live. This once a week program provides an opportunity to integrate wellbeing education into the Whitefriars curriculum. Educational research would suggest that wellbeing should not be looked at in isolation, that academics and wellbeing are intertwined and equally as important (White & Kern, 2018).

In term 1, the students looked at their learning strengths, goal setting and organisational skills. The issues of bullying and violence were also explored, culminating in an awareness raising day for the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence .

In term 2 in our Pastoral Care groups, the focus was on the themes of gratitude and happiness. The students ran activities for each other with the aim of fostering a greater sense of what they should be grateful for and what makes them happy, two important pillars in developing resilience.

In term 3, the focus will be on healthy brains. Under the guidance of their Wellbeing teacher, Pastoral Care groups will choose two aspects of FLOURISH that they would like to investigate and complete an activity based around these areas (Nicola Morgan, Positively Teenage: A positively brilliant guide to teenage well-being, 2018).

It is important to note that the Wellbeing Program is not a 'silver bullet' to resolve all issues of mental health, however, we would hope that a continual development and integration of this program will contribute in some way to developing young men who are confident, resilient and able to cope with the life's challenges.
